We sincerely hope that the care-givers/teachers will find this document handy in providing pupils with inspiring and life changing learning experience.

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INTRODUCTION

Early Childhood Care and Development Education (ECCE) is concerned with the care and education of children aged 0-5 years or just before the age of formal schooling. The age 0-5 years is perceived as the period of immense opportunity for growth and development. It is a critical period in the development of the child as experience gained at this stage may make or mar the child permanently.

The Federal Government of Nigeria has translated the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) into Child Rights Act and furthermore into Universal Basic Education (UBE) Act 2004 which placed Early Childhood Education (ECE) into the mainstream. These laws and acts provide for interventions and actions that will improve the well being of Nigerian children. The Nigerian Educational Research and Development Council (NERDC) and United Nations International Children Education Funds (UNICEF) took the lead in providing a National Curriculum for ECE.

The Curriculum planning emphasizes and caters for the physical development and stimulation of the child. It addresses all the critical aspects of early childhood care which yields the highest dividends and the most sustainable gains for children and their families, communities and the nations of the world. It is aimed at not only assuring child's survival but nutrition inclusive.

The integrated approach to ECE comprises programmes on various topics that are grouped into eight (8) themes which focus and reflect on the objectives of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs).

These are:

- Physical Development
- Affective /Psychosocial Development
- Cognitive Development
- Foods and Nutrition
- Health
- Water and Environmental Sanitation

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- Safety Measures
- Protection Issues

The Lagos State Ministry of Education reviewed and compiled these themes into eight (8) Nursery subjects which are arranged into weekly teachable topics for the three terms in an academic year to produce Unified Schemes of Work for Pre-Primary classes (Nursery classes).

The subjects are arranged as follows:

- Physical Development (PD)
- Social Habits
- Letter Work
- Number Work
- Health Habits
- Basic Science and Technology
- Civic Education
- Yoruba Language for Kindergarten Class (Age 5) Only

These subjects are arranged into four (4) age cohorts of learning, which are:

- i. 0-2 years Crèche/Playgroup
- ii. 3 years Nursery One
- iii. 4 years Nursery Two
- iv. 5 years Kindergarten

The objectives, contents, activities and caring/learning materials are selected and prescribed for every topic. Some emergent issues such as HIV/AIDS, Peace and Gender Issues are also included in the Nursery Curriculum. The ECE prepares the child for smooth transition into primary schools which ensures universal access to primary education. It is also to provide enough care and supervision for the children while parents are at work.

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<u>DEVELOPMENTAL MILESTONES</u> 0 – 18 MONTHS <u>CRÈCHE</u>

ONE (1) MONTH

A child should be able to:

- · bring both hands towards his or her mouth
- · turn towards familiar voices and sounds
- · suckle the breast and touch it with his or her hands
- have BCG and DPT immunization
- · be registered officially (Birth registration)
- should be able to open eyes and see

THREE (3) MONTHS

A child should be able to:

- turn head towards bright colours and light
- · make fists with both hands
- move eyes to loud sounds
- · wriggle and kick with legs and arms
- · enjoying playing and clapping
- smile
- make coding sounds
- breastfeed frequently
- DTP immunizations
- sleep well during the day

TWELVE (12) MONTHS

A child should be able to:

- sit without support
 - crawl on hands and knees and pull up to stand
 - try to imitate words and sounds and respond to simple requests.
- potty or toilet training when a child is not using disposable nappy
- enjoy playing and clapping
- picking things up with thumb and one finger
- start holding objects such as spoon and cup and attempt selffeeding

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- give affection to a specific person
- say two or three words
- breast feed frequently and have other foods three to five times a
- have measles immunization (9 months)

EIGHTEEN (18) MONTHS

A child should be able to:

- walk unaided
- enjoy playing and clapping
- play with Lego
- arrange simple puzzles
- improve on self-feeding
- improve on toilet training
- imitate songs and dancing steps
- feed five to six times a day
- smile always

EARLY CHILDHOOD SCREENING TOOLS

HEARING - if the child:

- does not run towards the source of new sounds or voices
- has frequent ear infections (discharge from ear, ear-ache)
- does not respond when you call unless he can see you
- watches your lips when you speak
- talks in a very loud or soft voice
- does not talk or talks strangely

SEEING - if the child:

- is often unable to find small objects which he/she has dropped
- has red eyes or chronic discharge from eyes, spots on the eyes, a cloudy appearance to eyes, frequently rubs eyes
- often bumps into things while crawling or moving around.
- sometimes or always crosses one or both eyes (after six months of

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TALKING – if the child:

does not say mama (or equivalent) by 18 months of age)

UNDERSTANDING - if the child:

- does not react to own name by age 1
- cannot identify parts of face by age 1

PLAYING - if the child:

does not enjoy playing games by the age of 1 year

MOVING - if the child:

is unable to sit unsupported by 10 months

DEVELOPMENTAL MILESTONES **PLAYGROUP**

A child should be able to:

- walk, climb and run
- carry an object while walking
- point to objects or picture when they are named (e.g. nose, eyes etc.)
- recognize family members, people and objects
- say several words together
- scribble if given pencil or crayon
- enjoy simple stories and songs
- imitate the behaviour of others
- begin to eat by self
- repeat words that others say
- use two or three-word sentences
- feed five to six times a day
- learn to defecate in an appropriate place

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EARLY CHILDHOOD SCREENING TOOLS

HEARING – if the child:

- · does not respond when you call unless he/she sees you
- watches your lips when you speak
- · talks in a very loud or soft voice
- does not talk or talks strangely

SEEING – if the child:

- holds head in an awkward position when trying to look at something
- has red eyes or chronic discharge from eyes, spots on the eyes, a cloudy appearance to eyes.

TALKING - if the child:

cannot name a few familiar objects or people by age 2

UNDERSTANDING - if the child:

 seems to have difficulty in understanding things you say, when compared to other children of the same age

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PLAYING - if the child:

 does not play with common objects (e.g. spoon, pot, ball) by age 2

MOVING - if the child:

cannot walk without help by age 2

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
